One is left to discern the method in the remaining 2/3 of the book (what is the method? Is it essentially for the reader to memorize the specially selected standard list of the author of 350 words and phrases alone - hardly innovative). Secondly, for Arabic, this is said for each dialect is exactly, or almost exactly, the same as Arabic books for the other dialects. There is a standard script and it is simply read. Third, nothing is said so that the differences in dialects can be understood or learned. The declarations on grammar, for example, are the same for each Arab dialect. Third, the list of words/phrases is declared a rapid fire at the beginning of substantial chapters and therefore not explored, repeated or discussed further. Much could have been forgiven if the word/phrase was made more accessible, but served in this way - it is not.
